

Early Voting Accounts for 86% of Ballots Cast in 2022 Primary

The Recorder's Office would like to thank all Pima County voters who participated in the 2022 Primary Election. Here are some noteworthy tips, facts and figures:

2022 Primary Election

- The [Official Election Canvas](#) shows that 227,569 votes were counted during the Primary. That's 36.33 percent of the 626,320 registered voters in Pima County. In comparison, turnout for the 2020 Primary was about 42.8 percent and the 2018 Primary saw a 40 percent voter turnout.
- There were 196,624 Early Ballots cast before Election Day during the 27 days of Early and Emergency Voting. 26,818 Regular Ballots and 4,333 Provisional Ballots were cast on Election Day.
- 86 percent of the ballots in the 2022 Primary were cast early. In the 2020 Primary, Early Ballots made up 63 percent of the total; in 2018, it was 59 percent. This is a significant increase in Early Voting.
- The Pima County Recorder's Office mailed 356,987 Early Ballots for the Primary Election, which included Ballots automatically mailed to voters who signed up for the [Active Early Voting List](#) and Ballots requested online by phone or by mail.

2022 General Election

- [Early Voting](#) for the November 8 General Election begins on Wednesday, October 12, and goes through Friday, November 4. Early Ballots will be mailed to voters on October 12. [Emergency Voting](#) is available Saturday, November 5, and Monday, November 7.
- To make sure you're eligible to vote in the November General Election, we encourage all voters to check their registration status at recorder.pima.gov/VoterStats/VoterInfo. If you need to update your registration – because you've changed your address, party or how you'd like to receive your ballot – go to ServiceArizona.com. You might also have to update your registration if our office has contacted you about issues with your signature or other registration details. You only need to register if you're voting for the first time or reregister if you've moved, changed your party or changed how you'd like to receive your Ballot.

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- Early Ballots for the November 8 General Election will be mailed to voters starting on October 12. Mail back your ballot no later than November 1 to make sure we get it in time to be counted. You can also drop it off at any [Early Voting Site](#) or at any [Vote Center](#) on Election Day.
- All voters on the Active Early Voting List will automatically get ballots mailed to them. Voters can also request a one-time ballot online or by calling us at 520-724-4330. Please allow a week for your Ballot to arrive before calling. Visit our [Active Early Voting List page](#) for more information. If you would like to be removed from the Early Voting list, please fill out the [AEVL removal form](#) and mail it to the address on the form. You can also update your registration at [ServiceArizona.com](#).
- In the upcoming General Election, every ballot will include federal races, statewide races and initiatives and races specific to your local jurisdictions. Races will list candidates from various parties – Democrat, Republican, Libertarian and Independent.
- Help us clear our Voter rolls! If Official Election materials are sent to someone who no longer lives at your address, please check the box on the envelope that says, “If the addressee does not reside at this address, mark the box and return it to the U.S. Postal Service.” Then just drop it in the mail. No postage is required. Federal law mandates that Official Election materials cannot be forwarded through the mail.
- If you will be out of town when ballots are mailed in October, you can go to at recorder.pima.gov/BallotByMail to request a ballot be sent to a temporary location. Select “I would like my ballot sent to a different address.” You can also call the Recorder’s Office at 520-724-4330.
- We can also send ballots anywhere in the world. Overseas and military voters can go to recorder.pima.gov/MilitaryOverseasVoterInfo to see whether they qualify and to request a ballot. Those ballots will be mailed out starting September 24. Under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA), eligible voters will be sent their Ballots on September 23 to make sure they arrive on time and can be returned by Election Day.
